- ➤ Total Aviation Contracts 48
 - 46 airport development, design, or planning contracts
 - 2 statewide planning or program contracts
- ➤ Public Airports Receiving Funding Assistance 39 of 103
 - 5 Commercial Service & 34 General Aviation Airports Received Federal and/or State Funding
- Percent of Georgia Airports Receiving Funds 38%
- Largest Funded Project: DeKalb Peachtree Airport, Rehabilitate Runway 3R-21L, Keel Replacement; Reconstruct Taxiway A; Total=\$12,616,946; Federal: \$9,438,586; State=\$2,110,099; Local=\$1,068,261



FY26 Proposed Aviation Program

- ➤ **401 applications** submitted
- 203 proposed development, equipment, and/or planning projects anticipated
- > State/Local Projects receiving funding-34 airport projects at 75% state participation and a 25% local match.

All projects in FY26 must have bids or final scope & fee by March 1, 2026.

Only exception is discretionary projects or projects identified by GDOT.

Total AIP Funding per year is Approximately \$40M



IIJA/AIG Funding (a Five Year Allocation of Funding based on an Airport's Federal Airport Classification)






Historical Annual Federal Funding (-ATL)

FY22 – FY25 budgets all had funds added in the mid-year budget



- Total commercial service \$415,794,971
- Total general aviation \$70,124,000 (FY22-25)
 - ~\$17M per year
- Awarded to Date \$47,126,385 (67% as of Oct 2025)
- Allocations to GDOT (as of Oct 2025)
 - FY22 100%!
 - FY23 80%
 - FY24 50%
 - FY25 40%



IIJA/AIG in Georgia (Non-Primary Airports)





FAA State Block Grant Program MOA

- Revised/Signed June 17, 2025; good for 5 years
- Requires States to pass along grant assurances/special conditions
- States must follow FAA national priority rating system when scoring & selecting projects
- FAA will only issue NPE if the airport has a project within the following 12 months, or FAA will carry over
- FAA will be lead agency for environmental oversight on all discretionary funded projects
- Section 743 replaced Section 163; interim guidance

FY27 Applications

- Notification to be sent in August
- BlackCat opened October 1, 2025
- Projects should be "ready" –

AIP eligible, on ALP, environmental determination (CatEx or EA)

- Applications must include:
 - Federal 424 Application or Application for State Assistance
 - Project Justification
 - Project Narrative
 - Project Sketch
 - Updated Detailed Estimate

Incomplete applications requesting funding in FY27 will be passed over

Due November 5, 2025

Updating Airport and CIP Information

- Update airport contact information
- Projects on CIP should be current (FY27-31)
- All projects should be moved to future year or removed
- If you need a project removed, contact Alan Hood
- Sponsors must submit projects consultants do not have permission to submit projects






State Approach Surface

Exhibit "A" Project

- ➤ Under SBGP MOA and per FAA Grant Assurances, sponsors are to update and maintain an Exhibit "A" Airport Property Inventory Map.
- FAA grant assurances: 4-Good Title; 29-Airport Layout Plan; 31-Disposal of Land

What we found

- Missing property records or historical records
- > Sponsors did not hold good title
- Surplus property not properly released
- Non-aeronautical use of property
- ➤ Non-compatible use of property
- > Parcels that need release or change in use



Exhibit "A" Project

Federally obligated land

- > Acquired via federal grant or surplus property
- > In an area of future or potential development for airport
- In an area of interest (existing/ultimate RPZ)


FAA Approvals

- FAA guidance requires a release of obligations for any property that falls under these categories.
- Federally obligated property requires an approved release or change in use request for non-aeronautical use.

Releases/change in use can only be approved by FAA
